

LINE



The lines in these two photos are leading lines, and create impact by guiding the viewer's eye to the focal point of the photos.



The radiating lines coming off the stem of the leaves and the petals of the dandelion create impact by adding interest to the photographs.





The main shape in this photo is the maple leaf, and I made it stand out because it is a different colour than the rest of the photo. There are also irregular shapes in the water drops.

SHAPE

The shapes in this photo are the butterfly wings, and I made them stand out by blurring the background.



FORM







The techniques I used to capture form were getting close up, and taking the photos from an angle where the light casts a shadow on my subjects. These shadows show that the subjects have depth and are not flat shapes.



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The main subject of my photo is the trees in the bottom third of the photo. The space in the blue sky and clouds adds interest to the photo without being distracting.





TEXTURE



The adjectives that describe this photo are rough, bumpy, spikey, and prickly.



The adjectives that describe these 2 photos are soft and fuzzy.







This photo has a large tonal range because it has bright highlights, dark shadows, and a range of tones in between. For example, the light coming from behind the thistle is bright, while the thistles have darker shadows. The background is blurred and also has a wide range of shades.

COLOUR







The hues in my photos are red, green, pink, and yellow.
The colours are all bright and saturated.



Reflection Questions

What composition techniques did you use to take your photographs?
Refer to your photos in the slideshow to give examples.

I used the "shoot close up for impact" technique to get close up photos of flowers, and to capture the texture in the sunflower photo. I also used the Rule of Thirds in my space photo, as well as the photos of the bee and squirrel to leave space in front of where the animals are looking. I changed my perspective by putting my camera underneath the dandelions and the trees to capture more unique photos.

Which Element of Design is your favourite? Explain why.

My favourite Element of Design is texture. Texture is my favourite Element of Design because it shows details in nature, especially when you get close up. I also like how texture allows you to show people what something feels like even if they can't touch it. How has taking pictures changed the way you see or experience nature?
